

Dear Alumni/e, Friends, Colleagues, and Students,

The approaching end of the first year of my appointment as chairperson provides me with an opportunity to share with you many recent initiatives and other news from CMU's Department of Art. The year began well with notification from the National Association of Schools of Art and Design that we received accreditation and Associate Membership. This culminates great efforts by the Department, supplemented by those of the Dean's Office and the Office of the Provost. Many thanks go to the Art Department faculty and staff, all of whom worked so diligently to reorganize and improve the program, creating an even stronger environment for students to learn, come together, and prepare for their future. We wish the best especially to three faculty members who were involved in this process who are moving on in very different directions: Nedra Frodge, Carolyn Loeb, and Mariah Doren.

Student exhibitions this year have been remarkably strong, reflecting their culminating efforts and the knowledgeable guidance of our new Gallery Director, Pam Ayres. Efforts to construct a new gallery continue even as challenges and ways to resolve them are identified. The contribution this would make to our curriculum, the university, and the community keeps this a hot item on our agenda. Two other University Art Gallery exhibitions

highlighted the continuing commitment between the Saginaw Chippewa Indian Tribe and CMU: Twentieth Century Anishinabe Art:The Olga Denison Collection and Jason Quigno, Working Stone. In April the university dedicated a sculpture by Jason in front of the UAG on the corner of Preston and Franklin Streets. Titled "Ancient Honorable Stone Woman," the figurative form is carved from over two tons of black basalt that was shipped from Oregon and is over 2 million years old. We feel honored and committed to maintaining a presence on what many are referring to as the "cultural corner" of campus and welcome the great visibility this wonderful piece of public art will generate.

Our Barstow Artist in Residence this year was Anne Beck, who traveled from Brooklyn, New York, and had a great impact on many students with her interdisciplinary approach to classes for undergraduate and graduate students. The 3rd annual Barstow Arts and Design Lecture series was titled "Analog to Digital: Evolution or Revolution?" and resulted in standing-room-only crowds that listened to experts in the field of photography address present and future implications of today's digital technology. The symposium culminated with a well-attended panel discussion that offered much to consider about the use of camera-based images in our predominantly visual culture.

As you will read further on, many students have been recognized for their research and creative work. We are proud of their achievements and

recognize them at every opportunity, should you encounter any of them, please consider giving them a pat on the back! We have implemented many improvements in the department, from upgrading our technology in the computer labs to include video editing, and updating the many painting easels in the studios, to resurfacing many of the hallway walls, and purchasing new safety equipment for students participating in the annual bronze pour. Much of our ability to do provide these updates comes from your generous support, so thanks to those of you who have provided the extra funding that allows us to make timely improvements in facilities and equipment.





This year's Stephen L. Barstow Artist in Residence was Anne Beck, who spent Spring semester in the department. While here, Anne taught the graduate seminar and an advanced drawing class in which she interwove traditional and experimental approaches, including collage, digital imaging, xerography, and bookbinding. Anne's MFA in painting is from Pratt Institute, and she works in painting, drawing, printmaking, and book arts. She co-publishes Acid to Zinc, a serial artists' book, and works with an international collaborative, The Printmakers Left, on prints and book arts. She is based in Brooklyn, NY, where she does graphic and scenic work for the film and television industry.
